WHAT IS SART?

A Sexual Assault Response Team, or SART, is a multi-disciplinary team consisting of advocates, law enforcement, medical personnel, and prosecutors. This team focuses on the acute medical response to sexual assault & forensic evidence collection, while also focusing on the potential for the victim to report the crime they have experienced. The process is victim-centered, and therefore the victim can choose the level of response/care that is provided.

maintain SART teams. Her goal is to enhance sexual assault response systems and survivor care in Iowa's rural communities.

BENEFITS OF SART

Victim

Coordinated response, sensitive intervention and Information about options.

Medical

Increase training on forensic and medical care. Clear direction on best practice for victim care. Increased collaboration with victim-serving community partners.

Law Enforcement

Increase reporting. Specialized training protocol for investigation. Better access to victims for follow-up.

Prosecution

Better informed victims. Better reports from law enforcement and medical staff. Victims are supported well in cases that proceed.

Community

Increased community safety through increased reports and/or prosecution for survivors.

HOW DOES SART HELP?

Upon receiving notifications that a sexual assault has occurred, SART sends key team players to meet with the victim. The advocate, law enforcement and medical person are all able to respond and discuss options available.

How Can I Help my Friend, Family Member, or Partner?

- + Respect their confidentiality.
- Believe your friend, family member, or partner.
 - + Avoid judgmental comments.
- Ask how you can be of assistance rather than giving advice.
- Respect their decision even when yours may be different.
 - + Be a good listener.
 - Avoid pressure to resume any form of sexual activity until initiated by your partner.
 - Offer unconditional love and support.
 - Some things you can say are:

"I'm glad you are alive."

"It's not your fault."

"I'm sorry it happened."

- Become informed: Gather all the information you can about sexual violence and know what community resources are available.

How can an Advocate help?

- Remaining with you (if you wish)
 throughout your examination,
 explaining all medical procedures and
 tests.
- Explaining your options and choices concerning police reporting and legal rights.
- Talking about the emotions and trauma that typically follow acts of sexual violence.
- Providing support and assistance to victims and family members.

Prevention Education

STEP 2- MINIMIZE OPPORTUNITY

We often talk about stranger danger or never trust someone you don't know, when educating our children. But what we frequently overlook is that the majority of sexual abuse is occurring with someone the family trusts. In our previous newsletter we presented statics from *Darkness to Light-Stewards of Children that show that 30% of children are abused by family members and as many as 90% are abused by people the family knows.* This certainly makes us re-think how to protect our children.

So what does it mean to minimize opportunity?

Darkness to Light-Stewards of Children (www.D2L.org) gives us tips and ideas on how to help minimize situations that may present a risk.

- IF YOU ELIMINATE OR REDUCE isolated, one-on-one situations between children and adults, and children and other youth, you'll dramatically reduce the risk of sexual abuse.
 "80% of sexual abuse occurs in an isolated, one-on-one situation."
- CREATE AND LOBBY FOR POLICIES reducing or eliminating isolated, one-on-one situations in all
 youth serving organizations, such as faith groups, sports teams, and school clubs. These policies
 should ensure that all activities can be interrupted and observed.
- 3. ONE-ON-ONE TIME with trusted adults is healthy and valuable for a child. It builds self-esteem and deepens relationships. To protect children while nurturing these relationships: Drop in unexpectedly when the child is alone with an adult or another youth, even if it a trusted family member. Make sure outings are observable if not by you, then by others.
